SUCCESS!

In this Fall issue of the Shiawassee Community Foundation newsletter, we look back at all the changes that have happened and how thankful we are of our continued SUCCESS!

This past year we saw increased participation in Raise Up Shiawassee. Our fall collaboration of non-profits, community members and local businesses working together to give where they work and live is inspiring.

The Fall Grants were awarded and distributed in December. In January, our Winter Grant cycle began with our Youth Advisory Council (YAC) grants and Emmert Grant applications opening for youth-oriented projects. In total, 150 scholarships were awarded to students from 11 area schools, totaling \$178,235 from 88 funds. Grants totaling \$40,472.34 were given to help support local community projects and organizations.

This past spring, our SCF board participated in a working retreat with four panel members from various areas of our county discussing emerging needs in our community. This brought an awareness of how important each of the non-profits are in our community and what an integral role they play in the overall health and well-being of our county. In the spring, we held our first live scholarship awards night in two years at the Perry High School Auditorium! It was wonderful to see parents and fund representatives in-person again!

Our summer grant cycle opened mid-June and we just recently awarded those grants. One of the new grants this year was the William "Bill" Brooks Memorial Fund. It was so rewarding to see Bill's family, Heather and Cheyenne, present the first check in his honor. That's what the Foundation is all about - caring people giving back to the community!



It has been such a busy year with tons of other projects and collaborations happen-

ing. We will keep you updated with posts on our website and in these newsletters. I hope you continue to work with your favorite community organization in assisting them with their mission. That's how we measure Success!
